SYNOD ON SYNODALITY: At Masses this weekend, I will speak about this “novelty” for most of us called the Synod. As mentioned last week, it is Pope Francis himself who is asking all members of the Church to take part in a synodal process. In it, we listen to the Word of God and to the Holy Spirit in prayer. In that prayerful spirit, we then listen to one another and share what we ourselves discern to be God’s direction for the Church in our times on this or that particular issue.

In practical terms, I am approaching people in these days to lead this process in both our parishes. I also received information this past week from the Diocese of Galloway Synodal Team which I think is worth sharing with you. I quote: “A diocesan team is planning, developing resources, and organising training to carry out the participatory phase of the Synod. We will soon begin sending short, weekly bulletin inserts which will help the laity to understand what a synod is, introduce people to the language of synodality, and explain the purpose and practicalities of this first, diocesan phase” and by which “people will have a regular opportunity to become familiar with the language and process before they are invited to actively participate. It would be very helpful if each parish, or cluster of parishes, could identify one or two people who may be willing to work with the diocesan team for the participatory phase, the bulk of which is likely to take place in January and February 2022, both in person and online.

“These ‘coordinators’ will be provided with training in November, and will be asked to facilitate leading prayerful discussions in their own parish/parish cluster and then feed back to the diocesan team. In other words, we will be taking our time gradually to get used to hearing and talking about synodality and, of course, doing it and experiencing it together. I encourage everyone to be open to the Spirit speaking through our chief pastor, Pope Francis, in this matter. If we do so in faith, trust, love and hope, the Lord himself will bring out of this important initiative the fruits of salvation and glory he desires. In the meantime, we can all start by using the Synod Prayer.

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer *Adsumus Sancte Spiritus*, the first word of the Latin original meaning, “We stand before You, Holy Spirit,” which has been historically used at Councils, Synods and other Church gatherings for hundreds of years, being attributed to Saint Isidore of Seville (c. 560 - 4 April 636). As we are called to embrace this synodal path of the Synod 2021-2023, this prayer invites the Holy Spirit to operate within us so that we may be a community and a people of grace.

## SYNOD PRAYER

We stand before You, Holy Spirit,  
as we gather together in Your name.  
With You alone to guide us,  
make Yourself at home in our hearts;

Teach us the way we must go  
and how we are to pursue it.  
We are weak and sinful;  
do not let us promote disorder.  
Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path  
nor partiality influence our actions.

Let us find in You our unity  
so that we may journey together to eternal life  
and not stray from the way of truth and what is right.  
All this we ask of You,  
who are at work in every place and time,  
in the communion of the Father and the Son,  
forever and ever. Amen.

SYCAMORE COURSE (St. Mary's): Mr. Gordon McMillan and a few others are taking the lead in introducing Sycamore to St. Mary's Parish. Here once again is a message from Gordon:

“How can we find happiness? What’s the meaning of life? Is there a God? Does prayer make a difference?”

“Sycamore is a video-based, informal course, about the Christian faith and its relevance for life today and is being used in parishes and schools across the UK and beyond. It gives space to meet other parishioners, share ideas, explore your beliefs, and think about questions that really matter. Over a six-week period, small groups of 6 to 10 parishioners, will meet each week for 60 to 90 mins. Each session will involve video clips to introduce topics followed by suggestions for discussion. There’s no pressure. You can be yourself without any fear of being judged.

“Sycamore is being introduced across our diocese. Bishop Nolan has invited each parish to engage with the Sycamore course to discern the will of God in the way we take forward our faith and Catholic Christian witness after the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic. It is a call and an opportunity for the whole diocesan family to pray, reflect and support one another whilst respecting our diversity.

## Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> October - 29<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the Year COP26 - Global Justice

Climate change is also an ongoing threat to poverty reduction, and it will intensify in coming years. New analyses for this report estimate that climate change will drive 68 million to 135 million into poverty by 2030. Climate change is a particularly grave threat for countries of Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia — the regions where most of the global poor are concentrated. The impacts of climate change can also include higher food prices, deteriorating health conditions, and exposure to disasters, such as floods, that affect both the poor and the general population. Especially for the poorest small countries, climate change is perhaps the most vexing challenge, and the problem is not of those countries' making. Human-induced rises in global temperatures and sea levels are almost entirely a product of levels of energy use by high-income nations and large, rapidly growing middle-income countries. ~ The World Bank

## **Glasgow Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26**

Our faith communities are united in caring for human life and the natural world. We share a belief in a hopeful future, as well as an obligation to be responsible in caring for our common home, the Earth.

We recognise the opportunities that COP26 brings in addressing the urgent need for action in limiting the effects of climate change and the critical importance of decisions made in this conference to take forward the agreement made in Paris in 2015.

People have exploited the planet, causing climate change. We recognise that the burden of loss and damage falls most heavily on people living in poverty, especially women and children.

We acknowledge the commitments made through the Lambeth Declaration in 2015. Now, because of the gravity of our situation, the impact of climate change around the world, and the inequality of its effects we seek to strengthen those commitments.

We commit to respond to this challenge by:

Reflecting deeply in prayer, meditation and worship to discern how to care for the earth and each other, and to encourage our respective communities to do the same.

Making transformational change in our own lives and in the lives of our communities through individual and collective action.

Being advocates for justice by calling on governments, businesses and others who exercise power and influence to put into effect the Paris agreement; to make the transition to a just and green economy a priority; and to commit to science-based targets that are aligned with a healthy, resilient, zero-emissions future.

We remind governments of their commitments made in Paris in 2015 to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees, and of Article 17 of the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights to protect the environment, the biosphere and biodiversity. We call upon them to take the urgent action needed to avert the loss, damage, and forced migration threatened by climate change.

We look to governments to work together and with others to create a positive vision for 2050 where addressing climate change is not just an opportunity to stop burning fossil fuels, but also: to achieve cleaner air and water; to reduce food wastage; to ensure a just and equitable sharing of the earth's resources; and to protect the habitats we share with all other life on whose health we also depend.

Across our doctrinal and political differences, we know that we must change our ways to ensure a quality of life which all can share, and we need to provide hope for people of all ages, everywhere, including future generations. To offer hope in the world we need to have confidence that those in power understand the vital role they have to play at the Glasgow COP26.

Our collective energy and prayers will be with those working for a successful outcome.
